Approval of September 19, 2024, Minutes

The minutes for the September 19, 2024, meeting were approved with no opposition.

Annual Legislative Report

Chair Lemma discussed the implementation of the various strategies used to address opioid abatement that have been implemented in counties and municipalities across the State of Florida. The chair provided a high-level review of the eleven recommendations included in the draft report that address substance use and co-occurring substance use and mental health disorders

Council Member Lee Constantine expressed concern with media reports suggesting Opioid Settlement dollars are being utilized to combat Amendment 3. Chair Lemma emphasized that Amendment 3 has not been discussed by this Council and reminded Council members that the Opioid Trust Fund has \$18 million allocated for primary prevention and media campaigns.

Final Vote on 2024 Statewide Council on Opioid Abatement Report

Council Member Peters motioned to approve the report with Council Member Dougherty providing a second. The motion carried with all members voting in favor.

Public Comment

Lenette Serlo, Founder of Generation O, a national organization for opioid exposed children, discussed her family's experience with neonatal exposed children, and the organization.

John Newcomer, CEO of South Florida Behavioral Health Network, commented that Florida needs to ensure the state can demonstrate that the utilization of opioid funds actually mitigates the opioid epidemic.

Closing Remarks

Chair Lemma provided closing remarks.

March 2025

History & Process



- December 12, 2023, Lutheran Services of Florida (LSF) presented information on the Opioid Settlement Funds to the Citrus Board of County Commissioners (BOCC)
- Commissioners authorized Citrus County Opioid Task Force take the lead in reviewing, prioritizing to fill the gaps in the community.
- Subcommittee was established.
- Projects were reviewed, discussed, and voted on by the subcommittee members.
- Approved projects were then forwarded to LSF for executing purchase orders and contracts.



Citrus County Opioid Task Force and LSF Health Systems - A Partnership to Mitigate the Opioid Crisis

- LSF Health Systems, the Behavioral Health Managing Entity was given the responsibility to assist counties in the planning, contracting and disbursement of Opioid Settlement funds.
- Through this partnership the roles and responsibilities were determined to create an efficient and responsive process.
 - LSF Health Systems
 - Provide Technical Assistance on allowable use of funds
 - Executed Purchase Orders for approved vendors based on approved projects
 - Pays invoices, tracks and reconciles expenditures
 - Available to assist the County with administrative requirements such as data reporting and Implementation Plans



Process



How We Started

- Challenges and gaps identified by task force members during monthly meetings.
- Goals for the dollars were to go to agencies that developed one-time programs or expanded services. (Exhibit A & B)
- Scope of work: treatment and recovery service, MAT, school age prevention, wrap around services, and expanded services.



Measures and Outcomes

- Several of the programs are still in the process of being implemented.
- Outcome data is collected by the managing entity through the scope of work. Invite recipients to report at future task force meetings.

Future Plans

- Working with managing entity for future funding.
- 100% of funding goes towards projects, no administrative fees are coming from the dollars.
- Continue to develop and increase in-county resources and support.



FY 2023-2024 OSPG Program

- \$6.023 million budget
 - Individual program budgets ranged from ~ \$20,000 to \$500,000

 - Treatment (6)
 - Recovery Support (8)

FY 2023-2024 OSPG Programs Scope of Services - Prevention Examples

Youth	Screenings	Resource Campaign
After-school program to help young people develop healthy decision-making attitudes and skills and enhance their knowledge to prevent substance misuse, implemented across 45 sites, reaching more than 2,750 unduplicated youth	Hosted 30+ community outreach events where 200+ individuals were screened with evidence-based tools to identify individuals at risk for opioid use disorder and connect them to resources and services	Mailed postcards with information on Take Back Day, One Pill Can Kill, 988 Crisis Line, reached 400,000+ households in metro Jacksonville area

FY 2023-2024 OSPG Programs Scope of Services - Treatment Examples

Mobile Units	Uninsured	Unhoused/Housing Insecure
Focused outreach in high-risk zip codes to enroll ~ 50 new clients into long-term addiction care	Provided 300+ uninsured patients with Medications for Opioid Use Disorder (MOUD)	30+ received MOUD and were connected to case management services and linked to resources such as primary care, health insurance, Medicaid, and SSI/SSD

FY 2023-2024 OSPG Programs Scope of Services - Recovery Support Examples

FY 2024-2025 OSPG Program

- \$5.069 million budget
 - Individual program budgets ranged from ~ \$122,000 to \$500,000
- 14 programs across 9 agencies:
 - o Prevention (6)
 - o Treatment (4)
 - Recovery Support (4)
- 8 programs re-awarded from FY 23-24, and 6 were newly awarded



- This agency is proud to offer care that includes internal medicine, geriatric care, behavioral health, medication assisted treatment (MAT) center, home visits, intensive outpatient programs, after care, and of course opioid preventative, supportive and treatment strategies.
- This agency prioritizes continuous preventative and supportive care for all patients and families surviving opioid use, abuse, and addiction via in person and through technology.

Our Community

- Dedicated to treating addiction, ACE Medical is proud to serve over 350 patients per month in Jacksonville and St. Augustine, Florida
 - 15-25 patients seen daily
 - Up to 6000 suboxone patients treated annually
 - >200 patients seen pro bono

Funding

- In January of 2024, ACE Medical was awarded funding for **three** grants under the guidance and supervision of the OSUD Grants Committee in Duval County, Florida
- This funding was divided into three subsections:

Prevention: \$38,400.00

• Recovery: \$29,850.00

• Treatment:\$103,320.00




What is your age? 29 responses









What is the highest level of school you have completed or the highest degree you have received? ^{29 responses}




Which of the following categories best describes your employment status? 29 responses




How satisfied are you with your current living arrangement 29 responses







What are your living arrangements (Past 30 days)? 29 responses




In the past 30 days have you suffered from more than 5 days of anxiety? 29 responses




In the past 30 days have you suffered from more than 5 days of serious depression? ²⁹ responses




Have you had stress due to substance abuse in past 30 days? ^{29 responses}




Are you currently awaiting trial or sentencing? 29 responses



Do you currently have any form of health insurance? 29 responses




Do you currently have a primary care clinic (doctor, nurse provider)? 29 responses




How satisfied are you with our mobile unit?







REDUCTION IN OPIOID-CAUSED AND OPIOID-RELATED DEATHS, 2021-2023




Florida saw a decrease in both opioid-caused deaths and opioid-related deaths from calendar years 2021 to 2023.



REDUCTION IN FENTANYL CAUSED DEATHS FROM 2021-2023


FENTANYL CAUSED DEATHS, 2021-2023



COORDINATED OPIOID RECOVERY (CORE) NETWORK

FY 2023-2024 CORE EMS and Receiving Clinic Highlights

- EMS responded to 198,716 calls for individuals with substance use disorder (SUD), of which 24,215 were for individuals with opioid use disorder (OUD).
- EMS responded to 62,876 overdose calls and reversed an overdose with naloxone on 23,677 of the calls.

HOPE FOR ADDICTION RECOVERY


- CORE receiving clinics or treatment centers have served 64,381 individuals with SUD.
 - Of the 64,381 individuals served with an SUD, 28,344 (44%), had OUD.
 - Of the 28,344 individuals served with OUD, 18,200 received medication assisted treatment (MAT).



To date, the CORE Network has expanded to include 47 counties throughout Florida.

PEER SUPPORT SERVICES EXPANSION

Florida continues to steadily increase the number of Certified Recovery Peer Specialists who provide peer recovery support services throughout the state.
